


Family-Friendly Guide for Fifth Grade English Language Arts

Fifth-grade students have a firm grasp of the basic academics. The *South Carolina College-and Career-Ready Standards* guide students into reading and writing skills that are more complex. From this grade on, writing becomes more important and more frequent. In fifth grade, students practice and refine the skills learned in the lower grades. They are encouraged to think and analyze more deeply. At this age, students are able to take more responsibility for organizing and prioritizing their work.

LEARN ABOUT THE STANDARDS

The South Carolina College- and Career-Ready Standards for English Language Arts (ELA):

- Outline the knowledge and skills students must master so that, as high-school graduates, they have the expertise needed to be successful in college or careers.
- Provide a set of grade-level standards, "stair steps," based on the previous grade's standards which serve as the foundation for the next grade.
- Ensure that no matter where a student lives in South Carolina, the expectations for learning are the same.

Human knowledge now doubles about every three years. Therefore, revision of South Carolina's standards occurs periodically to respond to this growth of knowledge and increase of needed skills so our students will be ready for college or jobs. The *Col*-

lege- and Career-Ready Standards prepare students for dealing with the growing mass of information by not only emphasizing content knowledge but by also stressing the skills of reasoning, analyzing data, and applying information to examine and solve situations.

South Carolinians developed these academic standards for South Carolina's children. The ELA standards are aligned with the *Profile of the South Carolina Graduate*, which summarizes the knowledge, skills, and habits employers expect (See http://sccompetes.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/01/Profile-of-the-South-Carolina-Graduate_Updated.pdf.) Developed by business leaders, the *Profile* is approved by the South Carolina Chamber of Commerce and is endorsed by the Superintendents' Roundtable, as well as South Carolina's colleges and universities. The *Profile* demands world-class knowledge and skills, emphasizes critical thinking and problem solving, communication, and interpersonal skills.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS IN FIFTH GRADE

INQUIRY AND INVESTIGATION


Fifth-grade students are expected to analyze more deeply what they learn, read and investigate. At this level, students form ideas from their research and must support those ideas with evidence and details. Fifth graders use more materials to do research on a broader array of topics. These **Steps to Success** include:

LEARNING TO READ

Fifth-grade students read a wide variety of increasingly challenging texts, both fiction and non-fiction. The emphasis is now on understanding what is read. Fifth graders mastery of grammar and punctuation is growing. These **Steps to Success** include:

WRITING

Fifth-grade students spend a lot of time writing. They write essays, reports, and opinion papers that are several paragraphs long. They use more varied resource tools and are developing a writing style. These **Steps to Success** include:

COMMUNICATION

Fifth-grade students more clearly express their ideas and opinions in discussions and reports. They look more closely at presentations to analyze styles and content. These **Steps to Success** include:

Fourth Grade

- Paraphrase and respond to information given in a discussion, compare ideas, and examine evidence given to support certain points
- Express ideas gathered from many sources in a concise way. Conduct research independently.
- Report on a topic or give an opinion with facts and supporting details
- Speak clearly, adapting speech to task. Use standard English when appropriate.
- Create presentations using audio and visual tools to clarify ideas and thoughts
- Identify how and why a speaker chooses particular words and phrases or stresses certain words. Consider whether sufficient facts are included.

Fifth Grade

Develop ideas to contribute to a discussion, providing accurate and related information

- Report on a topic or give an opinion with facts and descriptive details. Use a logical order of ideas.
- Participate in focused conversations. Build on the ideas of others. Pose questions, respond to clarify thinking, and express new thoughts.
- Identify how and why the speaker chooses particular words and phrases or stresses certain words.
 Consider whether sufficient facts are included and how they are presented.

Middle School

- Connect the ideas of several speakers and provide ideas, evidence, and observations in a discussion
- Consider new ideas and different opinions in developing views. Justify view based on the evidence given.
- Analyze and evaluate the credibility and accuracy of information and findings
- Determine the effectiveness of a speaker's argument. Evaluate the reasoning on the sufficiency of the evidence and whether irrelevant evidence was used.



READING FOR ENJOYMENT AND ENRICHMENT

Fifth-grade students are better able to offer detailed analyses of characters and plots of books. They read a great deal more and with increasingly complex texts. Fifth graders think more analytically even about fictional stories and books. These **Steps to Success** include:

READING FOR INFORMATION

Fifth-grade students research and write reports several pages in length. Students develop their ability to gather and organize information then make conclusions and predictions from the text. These **Steps to Success** include:

LEARNING AT HOME

Your child may be more independent at this age, but your support and help are needed still to succeed in the fifth grade. Work with your child at home. Be informed about assignments and if help is needed with specific skills. Here are some suggestions for things to do at home to help your child learn:

- Watch the evening news with your child and write down the verbs and adverbs used in the broadcast. Watch for mistakes ("The boy was bit [bitten] by a shark." "The plan went smooth [smoothly].") Create a new broadcast substituting verbs and making the action more exciting by using adverbs. Or have your child "act out" the verbs and adverbs used in the news.
- Getting the order of events correct is important in writing and in science and math. Have your child write down instructions for making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich or whatever the favorite is. As the instructions are read out, follow them precisely. Were they detailed enough? Let your child see if some directions were omitted or out of order. Explain how this is important in studying, writing, and learning. Try again with an activity such as dressing for school.
