Camperdown Academy specifically exists to address the requirements of exceptional needs students. The school uses strategies uniquely suited to meeting the needs of dyslexic students including multi-sensory teaching and a phonetic approach to understanding language known as the Orton-Gillingham Approach. 100% of teachers are trained in this approach, and it is utilized across all programming and activities as a way to provide consistent, daily, and effective instruction with a schoolwide 3:1 student to teacher ratio. In addition to offering core academics in grades 1-8, each student receives a period of 1:1 or 2:1 tutorial as part of their school day. Additional programming includes training and outreach for public/private school teachers, paraprofessionals, and other community groups that work to provide services for learning disabled populations.

The report must be according to each participating private school, and for participating students, in which there are at least thirty participating students who have scores for tests administered. If the Education Oversight Committee determines that the thirty participating-student cell size may be reduced without disclosing personally identifiable information of a participating student, the Education Oversight Committee may reduce the participating-student cell size, but the cell size may not be reduced to less than ten participating students.

#### INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

RE: Independent Accountants' Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures School: Camperdown Academy, Inc. For the Year Ended June 30, 2018

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by Camperdown Academy, Inc. (the "School") and the SC Education Oversight Committee solely to assist you with respect to the School's compliance with the requirements of the Educational Credit for Exceptional Needs Children Program, for the school year ended June 30, 2018. Camperdown Academy, Inc.'s management is responsible for the School's compliance with the requirements of the Educational Credit for Exceptional Needs Children Program. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in the report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and associated findings are as follows:

1. We examined documentation to verify that all grants received under the Educational Credit for Exceptional Needs Children Program in 2017-18 were for eligible children enrolled in the school.

No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

2. We obtained documentation from the School and Exceptional SC detailing the amount of each grant per child and compared the amounts.

No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

3. We obtained documentation from the School and Exceptional SC detailing the amount of each grant per child and examined the documentation to confirm that no student's grant exceeded \$11,000.

No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

4. We obtained documentation from the School and Exceptional SC detailing the amount of each grant per child and examined the documentation to confirm that the School returned a prorated amount of any grant if the student receiving that grant withdrew during the school year.

No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

5. We examined documentation from the School to verify that the total amount of each grant received was used for tuition which is defined as "the total amount of money charged for the cost of a qualifying student to attend an independent school including, but not limited to, fees for attending the school and school related transportation."

No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. We were not engaged to, and did not, conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on the School's compliance with the requirements of the Educational Credit for Exceptional Needs Children Program. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.
