#### **Student Centered Academics:**

Charis Academy provides individualized instruction promoting the optimal holistic growth of each child for students on the autism spectrum or similar challenges whose educational needs are not fully met by their existing school programs, to include:

- High staff-to-student ration with one to one or small groups, allowing us to build customized programs for each student.
- Comprehensive approach that targets multiple areas of development-language, cognition, social behavior, motor and self-help skills-creating the best opportunities for success.

We offer a high degree of flexibility to meet unique and changing educational needs, aligning our work with a student's particular learning style. Continuous assessment of student's progress is integral to the program.

The Triple P-Positive Parenting Program is a parenting and family support system designed to preventas well as treat-behavioral and emotional problems in children and teenagers. Triple P's 17 parenting strategies focus on developing positive relationships, attitudes and conduct. It aims to prevent problems in the family, school and community before they arise and to create family environments that encourage children to realize their potential.

Triple P draws on social learning, cognitive behavioral and developmental theory as well as research into risk factors associated with the development of social and behavioral problems in children. It aims to equip parents with the skills and confidence they need to be self-sufficient and to be able to manage family issues with and without ongoing support.

In addition, the report must include information on individual schools if at least fifty-one percent of the total enrolled students in the private school participated in the Educational Credit for Exceptional Needs Children Program in the prior school year. The report must be according to each participating private school, and for participating students, in which there are at least thirty participating students who have scores for tests administered. If the Education Oversight Committee determines that the thirty participating-student cell size may be reduced without disclosing personally identifiable information of a participating student, the Education Oversight Committee may reduce the participating-student cell size, but the cell size may not be reduced to less than ten participating students.

Therefore, schools applying for participation in the ECENC Program for the first time in 2018-19 must provide the following to the EOC by **December 31**, **2018**:

Schools applying for continued participation in the ECENC Program must provide the following:

1. School-level assessment results for school year 2017-18 on national achievement tests for all grades tested in the school and for each grade with at least 10 students tested. Information should be provided for English language arts (reading) and mathematics achievement of students in the grade. Examples include: TerraNova, Stanford 10, Iowa Test of Basic Skills, etc. For grades 9-12, the school may provide average PSAT, SAT, ACT, or other scores as appropriate.

For schools that specifically exist to meet the needs of only exceptional needs students with documented disabilities, the EOC will work with the schools to provide information (including formative assessments, portfolios, etc.) that document the students' academic and social development.
